PARISH COUNCIL

The June meeting of the Parish Council was held on Wednesday 28th in the village hall. It was attended by the clerk and six parish councillors, councillor Alistair Gould (SBC) and two members of the public.

The Neighbourhood Plan: The next meeting of the informal working group will be held on 5th July at 7.15pm upstairs in the Red Lion. All welcome. The agenda will be circulated in advance to those who have agreed to share their e-mail addresses and will be on the website and notice boards. The terms of reference agreed at the last meeting were approved by the council, as was the logo chosen to identify and promote the work of the group.

Planning: The Parish Council is allowed to comment on plans submitted to Swale and publicly available to view on Swale planning portal. Applications for variation of conditions imposed following approval of the construction of commercial units in relation to the subsequent construction of mezzanine floorspace. (Land southeast of A299 slip road off Highstreet Road). The Council have previously objected to this development in terms of intensification of development, effect on traffic and need for additional parking. The Council agreed unanimously to object to these applications on similar grounds.

Allotments: The Council have submitted an application for a grant towards new fencing for the allotment. Meanwhile chicken wire will be applied to discourage rabbits from entering under the new gate.

Police: PC Gary Morris our local representative will attend the July meeting. We will discuss the Neighbourhood Watch community charter, amongst other topics. Parishioners can contact Gary directly to raise issues via email:

KCC AND SWALE

In a break from tradition, I'm going to deviate from my usual county councillor column this month and write a single column as a combined borough and county councillor or 'twin hatter' (the description used in political circles). Normal service will be resumed next month.

First of all, I'd like to say a huge thank you to the residents of Boughton and Courtenay for putting your faith in me and electing me to represent you at Swale Borough Council for the next four years. As you may be aware, shortly after the elections I was elected to be the Chair of Swale Borough Council's Environment Committee, a role which not only covers climate change and other 'green' issues, but also takes in everything from bin collections and churchyards to fly tipping and stray dogs, (and a great deal more). After an intense first few weeks of getting to grips with the dual roles, my workload is finally beginning to settle into a routine and I'm looking forward to the coming years. I've found the culture at Swale Borough Council to be significantly more open and accessible than it is at Kent County Council. Senior officers are far easier to contact and more forthcoming with responses to questions and enquiries. In the interest of balance, I should mention that there are a number of factors which may have contributed to this difference in culture. When I start-

ed at KCC in May 2021, we were only just coming out of the last Covid lockdown, masks were still commonplace and the induction day at County Hall still involved a fair amount of social distancing. The first two KCC full council meetings of the new council took place at Mote Park sports centre because the council chamber at County Hall was too small to allow councillors and staff to remain safely distanced from each other. In addition to this, in May 2021 I was entirely new to politics. I think it's safe to say I've learned more over the past two years than at any point since my mid-teens, and although I still have plenty to learn, I now know how best to get the information I need to carry out my role effectively. I have some big plans for the coming years. The biggest challenge will be finding ways to carry them out whilst working with the exceptionally tight budgets we have available.

Faversham Household Waste Recycling Centre (Tip) Kent County Council will be launching a consultation in mid-July to look at options relating to the Household Waste Recycling Centres across the county. Unfortunately for Faversham and Swale East, the Faversham site is currently lined up for closure in all of the very limited set of 'options' they have proposed. My colleague Mark Hood is on a working group at KCC which has been tasked with writing the consultation document. There is cross party consensus that a significant volume of additional information needs to be made public for the consultation to be meaningful. The cabinet member for Environment at KCC has said that she would be open to alternative suggestions, but

ST SWITHUN RAIN, WATER & LIVING WATER

St. Swithun's day is on 15th July and according to folklore if it rains on that day, it will rain for the next 40 days. St Swithun, Bishop of Winchester who died in 862, had asked to be buried in a simple grave outside of the cathedral "where the sweet rain of heaven may fall upon my grave". Later, against his wishes, on 15th July 971, his body was moved to an impressive tomb within the cathedral, as the Bishop of Winchester and Archbishop Dunstan of Canterbury had decreed he should be the patron saint of the cathedral. Forty days of terrible weather followed, which was thought to be because St. Swithun was unhappy at being moved. There is no proof to support this, but this is where the legend regarding the 40 days weather forecasting started, and later this ancient rhyme was written.

St. Swithun's day if thou dost rain For forty days it will remain St. Swithun's day if thou be fair For forty days 'twill rain nae mare A more modern one, supposedly from Buckinghamshire, is more to the point: If on St Swithun's day it really pours

You're better off to stay indoors! Heavy downpours during July and August will not be popular, but with long spells of dry weather, hosepipe bans and South East Water not being able "to keep up with the demand", rain is a blessing and a necessity, although it will be great if it only rained during the night.

Water is vital for all known forms of life on earth, it is the main chemical component of our bodies and 92% of our blood. Water is mentioned at the very beginning of the Bible "and the Spirit of God moved upon the face of the waters" (Genesis chapter 1:2). In

Revelation, the last book of the Bible, chapter 22 v. 17 "And let everyone who is thirsty come. Let anyone who wishes take the water of life". This is the water of life Jesus offers to the Samaritan woman at the well, as told in chapter 4 of John's Gospel. Jesus is returning to Galilee and decides to travel through Samaria, (most Jews would have taken a longer route to avoid doing this), and when a Samaritan woman comes to the well, he asks her to give him a drink. She is shocked, as why does a Jew ask a Samaritan woman for a drink. Jesus says to her, "If you knew the gift of God, and who it is that is saying to you 'Give me a drink' you would have asked him, and he would have given you living water". He then tells her that everyone who drinks the water from the well will be thirsty again, "but those who drink of the water that I will give them will never be thirsty. The water that I will give will become in them a spring of water gushing up to eternal life." The woman said, "Sir, give me this water, so that I may never be thirsty or have to keep coming here to draw water." Of course, she is confusing her physical needs with the spiritual, as she will still need water from the well. Jesus is saying the living water is a gift not a reward and anyone can ask him for it regardless of who they are or where they come from. Later in John's Gospel, chapter 7:37-38, on the last day of the Festival of Booths, Jesus said, "Let anyone who is thirsty come to me, and let the one who believes in me drink". As the scripture has said, "Out of the believer's heart shall flow rivers of living water."

Like the woman at the well, we will still need water to survive physically. The living water Jesus will give is for our souls and eternal life. There are no n restrictions on it and I am sure Jesus will be able "to keep up with the de-

mand".
